## ***PRESIDENT'S REPORT***

Our immediate past International World President John Kenney's theme for the past year was "The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands". This simple theme has been a constant reminder of our responsibility towards the goals and objectives we set ourselves and the club over the past year. R.I.P.P John Kenney also advocated among his goals for the year the "Safe Water Safe Lives" campaign to which we contributed Bio Sand Filter Project and also to the D9800 "Waste Water Treatment Project" in Barangay 6, Guiuan Municipality, East Samar Province in the Philippines. Our club in conjunction with RC Altona City have been working on a proposal for a clean water project for a village complex 25km from Kampala in Uganda. The project was drawn to our attention by our honorary member Barbara Nanteza, a member of RC Sunrise Kampala. Barbara is currently here in Australia and living in the Altona area while studying her Masters Degree in Medicine at Melbourne University.

We have met our commitment of US\$110 per member to The Rotary Foundation as well as having made a donation of US\$1,000 towards the Polio Challenge. At the last changeover I spoke about the challenge presented to us by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for Rotary to raise US \$200 Million to match the US \$250 Million granted to the Rotary Foundation by the Gates Foundation to assist the Rotary Foundation in its final push to rid the world of Polio. As of February 10<sup>th</sup> this year US \$109 Million has been donated by Rotary clubs around the world with the final year of the 3 year campaign to end in the 2010-2011 Rotary year.

Closer to home we are proceeding to implement a practical and positive sense of purpose toward bushfire recovery activities in and around the Kinglake area with a number of members to get involved hands on with a variety of projects.

In the past year we collected clothing, cooking utensils, stuffed toys and shoes to send to both Haiti and the Philippines in the wake of their natural disasters. To all those people who contributed and all the members who ferried donations I extend heartfelt thanks.

Our primary source of income for the last 33 years has been our annual Art Show. This year we moved our location to "Seaworks" in the Williamstown Maritime precinct and expanded the show as a result of a number of innovative ideas PP Therese, Charter Member Jim Mann & PE Peter S which resulted in a wonderful new concept and a great financial outcome. An outcome aided by the great assistance provided in the set up and running of the Art Show by 26 Friends of the club. We have

further augmented our funds with a series of BBQ's at Bunning's Altona North which have provided both much needed funds as well as an opportunity for members to enjoy some great fellowship. Special thanks to past member Pat Moran "The Sausage King" who has manned the early shift at all of our BBQ's to date, thanks mate.

As you read through the rest of this report you will get an idea of some of the ways in which these funds were distributed. In conjunction with RC Altona City we supported Justeli Liorca a student at Mt St Joseph's Girls College who went to New Zealand for the National Youth Science Forum. We also continued our award winning public speaking program at Seaholme Primary School delivered by our honorary member May Wilson and her toastmaster colleagues on behalf of our club.

The Early Childhood Intervention Trust has provided a special "Gamma Chair" and is also set to deliver a wheelchair friendly Cubby House to the Altona North Early Childhood Centre.

My thanks to our club member Vinh Hua who has managed to make several donations both cash and goods over the past year for various causes. Starting with a cash donation in appreciation of our well run Art Show he has then provided boxes and boxes of noodles for us to donate first to disaster relief for both Haiti & the Philippines and more recently to go into our start up kits for the homeless via our program with Latitudes (formerly Bay West Housing). These generous donations have been of great use in each case.

Lastly my sincere thanks to all the board members for their dedication and support over the last year. Also I wish to thank those members with special skills and expertise who have proved to be of great benefit to me and the club over the past year. I also want to thank all members for continuing to contribute their time and effort to the various programs of our club over the past year. The Future of Rotary has certainly been in your hands.

## ***EARLY CHILDHOOD INTERVENTION TRUST REPORT***

We have already handed over a "Gamma Chair" to the Altona North Centre. This chair is state of the art and fully adjustable to suit the particular needs of the child. It is a much needed and greatly appreciated piece of equipment being put to good use by the skilled educators at Yooralla. The chair cost \$4,900 and we are currently awaiting feedback from Yooralla about the possible need for a second chair.

A specially designed wheelchair friendly Cubby House has recently been completed and will be installed at the North Altona Kindergarten during the next school holidays. The task of construction has been undertaken by the students of the Victoria University's building division under the careful supervision of club friend and former GSE team member Michael Hick and the finished product is a credit to their workmanship. All members of the construction team were recently presented with a certificate of appreciation by P Jim Donnar to acknowledge both their time and great craftsmanship involved. With assistance from various partners we have been able to complete the project at a cost of \$3000.

We are fortunate to still have some funds at our disposal and will continue to work with Yooralla and the Kindergarten to provide practical assistance as it is required.

## ***NEW GENERATIONS REPORT***

Over the past year the New Generations committee has been very busy and as a result we have continued to support a number of programmes, details of which are as follows:

**National Youth Science Forum (NYSF)** – As well as supporting Justeli Liorca in her New Zealand NYSF experience we are currently working with Angela Yao who is our candidate for the upcoming NYSF program. Angela is a student McRobertsons Girls College. The total cost is she is successful will be \$2240 of which our club will cover the major amount.

**D9800 Youth Suicide Awareness** – The Primary objective of this committee is to “skill up” professionals already working with young people both in schools and the broader community so that they can identify the early warning signs of mental ill health. Our club this year made its first donation to a new ongoing contribution plan, whereby we contribute \$500 (or multiples of \$500) into a fund established at the Centre for Adolescent Health located in the Royal Children’s Hospital. These donations will be pooled to provide fee assistance to professionals seeking to apply to the program to be up skilled. **Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)** – Our attendee this year was Rebecca Petersen. The final Certificate Ceremony & presentation was very enjoyable and a fitting end to a big week. Our club was further represented by our former RYLA attendee Adriana Baron who assisted as a facilitator

**Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN)** – We had 2 students from the Laverton P-12 College attend, Elizabeth Lee & David Lelevoga. Both were Vice Captains of their classes. They both said after the camp that they greatly benefitted from the experience.

**Spirit West** – This is the community service arm of the Western Bulldogs Football Club that runs various training courses. Our club contributed \$1000 towards the Fresh Start program which gives opportunity’s to youth struggling in the main stream education system by providing equivalent schooling to a Year 10, 11 or 12 and also offers various apprenticeship training. This year they also offered a certificate in Sailing Training.

**Storm the Stage** – The club continued its ongoing support of this program which provides budding entertainers with an opportunity to both showcase their skills and assist their development. We had two entrants who made the Victorian finals but were unsuccessful in going through to the National Final. Going forward we will work with the Altona City Theatre to continue to find emerging talent to put forward and also work to raise the programs profile to encourage more clubs to get involved and to source participants from their local area.

**Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)** – Originally scheduled for May this year it has been postponed until August. We have sourced two teams of two, one from Emmanuel College and the other from Laverton P-12 College.

# ***VOCATIONAL SERVICE REPORT***

## **Seaholme Primary School 2009**

Once again in 2009 we conducted the now annual youth leadership/public speaking program at Seaholme Primary School during the 3<sup>rd</sup> term. This program is now in its 7<sup>th</sup> year. Each year between 75-95 students partake in the 10 week program in grades 4-6.

We have enjoyed good feedback from teachers and parents regarding the positive benefits of the program. Teachers often comment on the change in confidence in some students after only one session. Students who are often too shy to raise their hand in class or come out in front of their classmates and speak soon find the confidence to do so. Students find the transition to secondary school much easier because of their improved ability to speak well and speak in front of large groups.

At the beginning of the 2009 program one teacher announced to us that as a result of participating in the program with the students she found the confidence to stand up in front of 250 and speak at Graduation something she had previously felt uncomfortable about. This teacher had been quite shy through her career and often avoided being photographed as she felt ill at ease. At graduation this year she was awarded an encouragement award marking her improved confidence and I look forward to seeing how much further she has developed when we return for the 2010 course.

At the end of the 10 week program awards are given voted for by the students for Best Speaker, Most Improved Speaker & Best Evaluator for their grade and the winners are presented with a trophy while all participants receive a certificate to acknowledge their involvement in the course.

Students come away from the course feeling more confident about themselves, far more prepared for the secondary school experience knowing they have faced one of the greatest fears of their lives. They can speak in front of their peers and present themselves for interviews with a confidence many do not possess and can look forward to a brighter future.

In 2010 we will have classes from grades 4-6 again with approximately 100 students taking part. The club is proud to be able to pass on these valuable skills that are not otherwise available within the main stream of education. Primary schools are now lining up to get involved in this sort of program but alas there are not enough volunteers to assist.

Our thanks to May Wilson and her colleagues from Toastmasters for once again giving their time and energy to make this program the great success that it has been and will continue to be.

## **Vocational Visit to the Seeing Eye Dogs Training Centre, Kensington**

On Tuesday the 28<sup>th</sup> July 2009 the club visited Vision Australia's Seeing Eye Dog training facility in Kensington. We were conducted on a very extensive tour of the facility during which the various aspects of the training program were explained in detail. At the conclusion of the tour there was an opportunity for our members to ask questions (and there were many) and the training staff were more than happy to answer them.

An enjoyable light lunch was provided during which P Jim presented Vision Australia with a donation of \$1000 from our club to be used in the further training of Seeing Eye dogs. As a result of our donation we were given a puppy called Norris under their "Adopt a puppy" program. As such our donation will assist in the extensive training of Norris and we will get regular updates on his progress. Norris was in attendance at the centre and club members had a chance to give him the odd pat and cuddle.

## ***FOUNDATION REPORT***

Our club has been a strong supporter of The Rotary Foundation over many many years. This year has been no exception. In summary we have satisfied our commitments to The Foundation, supported the Polio Challenge, supported the D9800 Water Project in the Philippines, encouraged our Club members to consider personal donations to The Foundation and we are currently working on mounting a major project in Uganda. The following provides a more detailed review of the year.

**Contribution to The Rotary Foundation** – Our club contributed \$3250 which equates to the US\$110 per member request made to all clubs and our planned figure for contribution.

**The Polio Challenge** – Our club met its commitment to contribute \$1000 to match the generous donation from the Bill & Melinda Gates foundation. The end is in sight for this project with cases of polio showing significant decreases in the four remaining affected regions. As a result the Rotary dream of a Polio Free world may at last been within our grasp.

**D9800 Water Project in the Philippines** – The club made a \$500 donation to this major project to construct an uncontaminated water collection and distribution system in a village in the Philippines which had seen out of control intestinal disease caused by unhygienic water.

**Personal Contributions to the Foundation** – There are currently 3 members of our club who are “Every Rotarian, Every Year” (formerly known as Centurion) members having contributed \$150 each directly to The Foundation. In addition I appealed for other members to consider various levels of personal donations with a number of members requesting the corresponding paperwork. Additional forms remain available for any interested members.

**The Uganda Project in conjunction with RC Altona City** – Barbara Nanteza has been a welcome addition to our club over the last 18 months. She is a Ugandan national and a member of the Rotary Club of Sunrise Kampala in D9200. Both D9200 and our D9800 are both part of The Foundation pilot program known as “Future Vision”. With Barbara’s assistance and in conjunction with RC Altona City we have initiated a fresh water supply project in a village 25kms from Kampala the capital of Uganda. The total budgeted cost of the project will be US\$64,000. The project involves a deep water bore, repair to an existing bore and water harvesting facilities at homes all aimed at providing fresh water in the interests of safe supply and disease prevention.

The project will be funded by donations of US\$5000 from both our club and Altona City; we are then seeking a further US\$8300 in donations from clubs in the Port Phillip Cluster. These donations will then be matched at both a district and Foundation level to arrive at the US\$64,000 budget.

## ***INTERNATIONAL SERVICE REPORT***

During the 2009-2010 Rotary year various projects have been undertaken and supported by our club through its International Committee.

The year was quite full on with a number of natural disaster occurring around the globe. We witnessed the devastating weather that lashed the Philippines while an earthquake struck Haiti. Due to these natural calamities our club donated funds for Shelter Boxes for distribution in these areas. On September 26<sup>th</sup> 2009 cyclone Ondoy (or Ketsana, its international code name) hit the Philippines inundating most parts of the country with the equivalent of a month's rain falling in just a few hours. A container filled to the brim with items donated by Rotarians, their family and friends was shipped out by DIK to Cainta, Rizal in the Philippines to provide aid to the victims of the cyclone.

We took up the challenge presented to all Rotary Clubs for the eradication of the killer disease Malaria by contributing to the district fund. We also made a small donation to the Waste water treatment project in Guiuan municipality, Eastern Samar, Philippines which joined with clubs from throughout the district made this project a success. The incidence rate of gastro intestinal disease and intestinal parasites caused by lack of sanitation has reached an all time high amongst the 400 families living in the village above where waste sewerage water is flushed into the drinking water supply causing these diseases to flourish unabated.

Currently in the planning stage is a water system project for Uganda in conjunction with RC Altona City. Both clubs are working hard to get this project from the planning stage and we are being ably assisted by a member of the Rotary club of Sunrise Kampala in Uganda working with us while she is in Melbourne doing her graduate studies in medicine here at Melbourne University.

My thanks to all involved in the various projects above for their commitment and passion to allow us to either do or plan for the various projects.

## ***COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT***

### **Latitude for directions for young people (Formally Bay West Housing)**

We are working with Latitude to provide some basic start up kits for homeless being placed into local accommodation. With a generous donation from Vinh Hua we have already supplied 360 units of prepacked noodle meals (half chicken and half beef). We have arranged for cleaning kits which include laundry powder, dish washing liquid and other cleaning items that come in a very handy bucket with a lid. We have ordered an initial 50 units of these. We intend to add other products in the future. These seemingly basic kits will certainly assist a person when they initially move into new accommodation. We have allocated a budget of \$2500 for this and thanks to donations like Vinh's we are able to get extra bang for our buck.

### **Hand Brake Turn**

The club has decided to support a candidate to participate in this initial training course. The course has a holistic approach and while providing the trainee with skills in mechanical repair & panel beating it also deals with the issues facing the at risk youth. This program gives young people identified as being at risk an opportunity to get their life back on track.

Every Hand Brake Turn course gives something back to the community. On each course participants restore an unroadworthy vehicle with the fully restored vehicle then donated to a member of the community in need, in a number of cases quite often victims of crime. This demonstrates to course participants in a real and practical way the consequences their negative attitude actions can have on people in the community by showing the consequences such actions can have on victims and their families while at the same time demonstrating the positive benefit of their hard work in assisting in restoring other people lives. A total budget of \$5000 has been allocated to this project and we are currently seeking suitable candidates to support.

### **Great Victorian Bike Ride**

While we have supported Bayside College and their students in the ride over the last number of years this year we have been able to donate directly to students in need of assistance rather than just a donation to the main pool.

As a result we have been able to financially support two enthusiastic yet otherwise disadvantaged students both of whom are part of the Advance Program (formerly known as the Victorian Youth Development Program) a select entry course funded by the State Government and run at Bayside's Altona North Campus. This program uses bike riding as a medium for community service, along with providing social and physical development.

The two students in question are flourishing within the Advance Program; however, they are both from financially disadvantaged backgrounds. One boy lives in the care of the DHS while the other relies heavily on government funding (EMA) to assist with their education. These boys are a perfect fit for a desire to provide targeted funding for the Bike Ride.
